Other services offered include

creating pots for businesses to brighten the entryway or surround an outdoor eating area. The foliage are changed and freshened up on a regular basis. The plants can be selected for the seasons and special events.

Schaefer designs gardens for homeowners as well. She likes to

work with what you already have and add to it, selecting the right plants for each area. "Teaching the customer how to take care of their own gardens is the key to a beautiful garden," said Schaefer.

When creating your garden, you will need to first come up with a design. Feng Shui is known to be a way of life, which helps us to be



in harmony with our environment. Ancient Chinese philosophers saw that the movement of the sun and planets affects all living things. The Chinese used companion planting techniques and planted according to solar and lunar cycles. It is all about planting in the right place at the right time.

It is important to have a basic knowledge of the elements and how they interact with one another. The Feng Shui garden consists of five elements - Water, Earth, Metal, Wood, and Fire. Trickling streams and metal wall fountains will provide a beautiful tranquil focal point, but do not use a fountain made of ceramic or stone. The earth element counteracts the positive effects of water according to Feng Shui principles. If you cannot have a fountain or pond, you can symbolize water with the use of the colors blue or black. The elements must be balanced, for example too much water will cancel out fire.

The use of rocks and large

stones, clay statues and terracotta urns represents Earth and mountains. Metal balances the negative effects of Earth and can be symbolized in furniture, garden borders, wind chimes and sculptures. Wood is a symbol of birth and new life, and trees are the typical symbol of this element. Fire can be represented with the color red as well as an outdoor fireplace or solar garden stake lights.

You may have heard of Yin and yang - negative and positive. A growing plant is yang and the plant dying and the seeds falling to the ground is yin. One is not better than the other. In fact, they must both exist for balance. In order to appreciate light, there must be darkness.

You must take the time to work on your garden in order to reflect a healthy energy around your home. Do not allow the plants to become overridden with weeds. In a Feng Shui garden, you should avoid cactus, roses, bougainvillea,

and other thorn-ridden plants. Plants to shop for include Jade Plant, Peonies, Silver Crown, Chrysanthemums, Money Plant, Plum Blossom, Narcissus, Lilies, and Bamboo.

Lilies make ideal indoor plants because they can neutralize common pollutants, such as formaldehyde, which can be found in carpets and paints. For outdoor plants that can stand up to the hot Florida heat, choose from orange trees, magnolias, and Dwarf banana plants.

Animals represent symbols in Feng Shui. For example, the lion is considered a symbol of the sun, since it is strong and courageous. A pair of lion statues at the opening to your garden or home will protect the place from bad luck.
